

colourful vases and trinkets. We were then ushered upstairs to the huge bustling restaurant. Time also permitted us to visit Chang Ling that afternoon, a temple encompassing many years of Chinese history and impressive architecture. This was peaceful and offered time for reflection.

WORLD HERITAGE SITE CHAUN-DIXIA VILLAGE

The following day we travelled to the World Heritage Site of Chaundixia Village. A solitary village in the mountains, dating back to the Ming period. Its inhabitants are all descendants of the same 'Hun' family. Parts of the village were run down, but full of character and great for photos. The village, surrounded by mountains, stands on the northern gentle slope of the hills and is built in harmony with the terrain of the mountains. Steeped in history, our guide explained there were many quadrangle dwellings and a few courtyards with houses on three sides. The houses, most of which were in good order, had delicate gate piers as well as distinctive screen walls and along with the stone, wood and

by all – best of all was trying the 'battered leaves' taken from a local tree! Much time was spent here exploring the vast array of alleyways before heading up high to catch a glimpse of the entire village, from what appeared to be a bird's eye view.

On the return to Beijing that day, we had a surprise visit to a silk factory. Here we all learnt about the silk worm and the production of silk whilst having the opportunity to make traditional purchases before heading off to an evening meal of 'dumplings'. We were taken to a restaurant famed for its handmade dumplings. Behind a glass screen, were an army of staff busily making the dough and filling with exquisite delights. They were bemused to see a sea of 26 faces and cameras, all scrabbling to take photos of them at work!

MORNING EXERCISE AT THE PARK

A few brave souls on the morning of the final full day, made their way to the local park to witness Tai chi. It was 8am and the park was full to the brim! Ballroom dancing, gymnastics, Tai chi, speed skating were all taking place; the atmosphere was electric and energetic. Bitterly cold, the activities kept people warm and even



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
